

But Phillies lose

Another fine effort from Steve Carlton

Steve Carlton's toughest audience is himself.

The superb left-hander, who seems to be almost single-handedly keeping the Philadelphia Phillies from sinking into the International League, came up with what most observers thought was another fine performance Monday night.

But a flyball home run and a lack of support at critical times proved Carlton's undoing as the Phils suffered a 4-2 loss to the New York Mets.

The loss left Carlton with a 23-9 record and three of those losses have been at the hands of the Mets. This loss just about ruined any remote chance Carlton had of reaching the 30 figure.

Carlton, who leads the league in starts, victories, shutouts, complete games, innings pitched and strikeouts, wasn't about to talk about the fact that the Phillies left six men on base in the first three innings when they had a chance to break the game open.

Instead, he discussed what he felt were his shortcomings. "The bases on balls beat me," he said, "I had five walks and more 3-2 counts than I've had

all year. The fast ball kept sliding over the plate." But manager Paul Owens was a more sympathetic viewer. "He didn't pitch that poorly," he said. "The guy is only human and you have to give the Met batters some credit. But I would settle for that kind of a game from my pitchers anytime."

He added, "we had Jerry Koosman on the ropes in the first couple of innings. With one hit at the right time, we would have won the game 5-4 or 6-4 and everybody would have been happy."

Carlton was beaten by Duffy Dyer's homer that snapped a 2-2 tie in the sixth inning. Duffy also tripled in an insurance run in the eighth inning.

Koosman, now 9-11, went seven innings to get the win and Tug Mcraw went the final two innings for his 23rd save.

Philadelphia got both of its runs in the first inning on Larry Bowa's single, a walk, double and Roger Freed's sacrifice fly. But the Phils couldn't take advantage of their other opportunities and were blanked the rest of the way.

In the only other games in the National League, Houston edged Los Angeles 4-3 and

Montreal blanked St. Louis 4-0.

In the American League, Minnesota swept two from Oakland 2-1 and 3-2, Cleveland edged Boston, 6-5, Baltimore nipped Milwaukee 3-2, New York beat Detroit 4-2 in a game called by rain after 5½ innings and Chicago nipped Kansas City 2-1.

Many experts think Cesar Cedeño is the best young player in baseball and he showed why as the Astros edged the Dodgers. Cedeño not only singled in a run, he saved the game with his glove. With two out and two on in the ninth, Willie Davis hit a shot up the alley that seemed likely to win the game for the Dodgers 5-4. But Cedeño snared the drive with a diving catch to end the game and preserve the Astros' triumph.

Jim Wynn hit his 22nd homer and tripled in another run for the Astros. Don Wilson and Jerry Reuss combined on a seven-hitter.

Mike Jorgensen drove in three runs with a double and his 12th homer and Balor Moore pitched his second straight shutout as Montreal blanked St. Louis. Moore allowed just six hits as the Expos pulled into a fourth place tie in the Eastern Division with the Cardinals.

St. Amour takes feature, Bourassa registers pair

Happy Go Lucky paced to a new lifetime mark and broke a losing skein to take the featured race at Rideau Carleton Raceway Monday night.

The six-year-old bay horse owned by D. L. McNeil of Ottawa and driven by the capable Andre St. Amour sat second as Canal View Way set the early pace leading the field to the half in a speedy 1.01.3. St. Amour made his move in the homestretch and won easing up in 2.04.4.

Betcha, only horse to stay within five lengths of the winner, came up to take second money while the fading pace-setter hung on to show.

Favorites ruled most of Monday's card with only two winners hitting double figures.

Happy Go Lucky was bet down to almost even money and paid \$4.60, \$3.40 and \$2.80 across the board.

Countess Rene came from the outside eight hole to take the eighth race and return \$15.50 on each \$2 win ticket while Albert Bourassa steered Anthony S from the rail in the

fourth race and they got down on top for a \$17.80 payoff.

Bourassa, incidentally, was the only driver to register two wins on the card which attracted a turnout of 1,645 punters who bet \$80,447 on the 10 races. His second triumph

came in the seventh race with Queens Nimbo (\$6.10).

As usual lights are out at the track tonight but the trotters and pacers will be back at it Wednesday night with the starting horn for the first race set for 7.45 p.m.
